One little baby, just like you. When it's bathtime, what does he do?

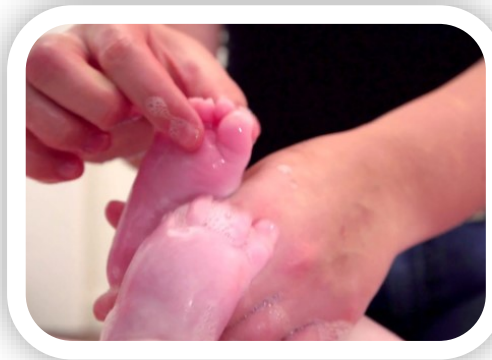

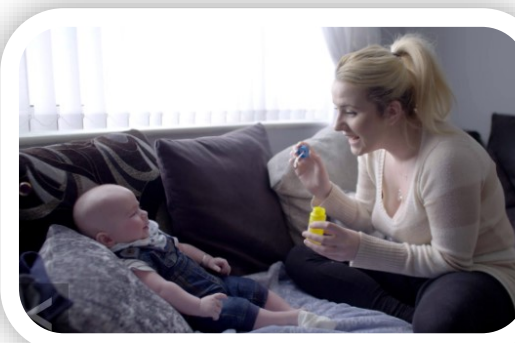
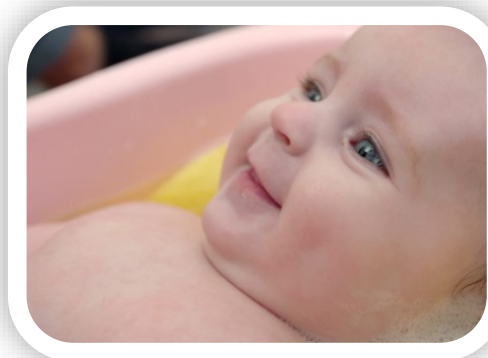
Bathtime Baby Fun things to do!
