Section 106 Infrastructure Funding Statement 2019/2020

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Introduction

Local Authorities are now required, under amendments to regulations (The Community Infrastructure Levy (Amendment) (England) Regulations 2019 No.1103 that came into force 1 September 2019) to produce an Infrastructure Funding Statement annually, that sets out details about planning obligation receipts and anticipated expenditure. This is to provide clarity and transparency to local communities and developers on the infrastructure delivered and expenditure incurred.

The infrastructure funding statement is an annual report which provides a summary of the financial and non-financial developer contributions relating to Section 106 Agreements (S106) within the financial year (1st April 2019 until 31st March 2020).

Throughout the infrastructure statement there will be references to the following definitions:

- **Secured** – Contributions have been agreed and a signed section 106 agreement has been produced. These contributions have not been received and if the planning application is not implemented, these will never be received.
- **Received** – The transfers of the money or non-financial contributions to the council as required under the section 106, have been received.
- **Allocated** – The contributions have been assigned to an upcoming project.
- **Held** – Contributions which have been received in previous years but have not been spent.
- **Spent** – contributions that have been utilised in the intended way as stipulated in the section 106 agreement in between 1st April 2019 and 31st March 2020.
- **Returned** – Money which has been returned to the developer. This could be due to money not being spent within the allocated timeframe.

Section 106 obligations

Under section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 a Local Planning Authority can seek planning obligations, for both on-site and off-site contributions, when it is considered that a development will have a negative impact that cannot be dealt with through planning conditions. For example, a new residential development can place additional pressure on things such as local infrastructure and school capacity. Planning obligations (Section 106) aim to mitigate the impact of a new development on existing facilities.

Planning obligations assist in mitigating the impact of unacceptable development to make it acceptable in planning terms. Planning obligations may only constitute a reason for granting planning permission if they meet the three statutory tests as set out in the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Regulations 2010 (as amended)¹ and in paragraph 56 of the NPPF, they are;

- Necessary to make the development acceptable in planning terms.
- Directly related to the development.
- Fairly and reasonably related in scale and kind.

Section 106 agreements are also used to ensure that North Lincolnshire Council planning policy requirements set out within the Local Plan are met.

Section 106 planning obligations include:

- Site-Specific financial contributions – these are secured and must be used for defined purposes for instance, the provision of education facilities, traffic and highways related works, open space provision and affordable housing contributions (where accepted in lieu of on-site provision)
- Provision of on-site affordable housing or education provision
- Non-financial obligations including requirements such as training and employment management provisions and travel plans.

Summary of Infrastructure Funding Statement

In the 12 months between 1 April 2019 and 31 March 2020, a total of 19 granted planning permissions, were subject to Section 106 agreements. The value of the financial contributions secured total £4,866,801.50 and 214 affordable units on-site, four of the affordable units on-site were through planning gain.

The financial contributions secured through these legal agreements will be used to provide or enhance existing and new infrastructure (both off-site and onsite) such as sustainable transport services and infrastructure, highway improvements, public open space, community facilities and educational facilities.

Between 1st April 2019 and 31st March 2020 North Lincolnshire Council received £674,999.85 financial contributions towards education, highways and open space. During this period £353,826.47 was spent on a number of projects, including enhancements to school capacity places at Barton St Peters School, Scunthorpe Town Centre public realm improvements and a variety of highways improvements within North Lincolnshire.

Infrastructure Funding Statement

Secured:

North Lincolnshire Council has secured planning obligations from 19 planning permissions in 2019/20 financial year through a Section 106 agreement and two section 106 variations. These obligations will be paid in future years, should the development progress in line with the planning permission. The planning obligations will be paid or provided by the developers either once development has commenced or once a specified number of dwellings have been delivered on the site, in accordance with the trigger points specified within the Section 106 agreement.

Figure 1: Section 106 financial obligations secured by type




Figure 1 provides a breakdown the total amount of financial obligations secured by contribution type. The largest proportion of money received was for education to increase pupil places. The next largest amount secured was for recreation followed by leisure then highways. As well as the monetary contributions secured above, 214 affordable houses have been secured on sites across North Lincolnshire.

Please note the figures above are based on the maximum amount that could be received, however as many applications are for outline planning permission the number of dwellings could change at reserved matters meaning some of the planning obligations may be reduced.

Received:

North Lincolnshire Council has received £674,999.85 in Section 106 contributions within the financial year 2019/20. Also, four affordable homes have been developed at Willow Farm in Hibaldstow within this period.

Figure 3: Section 106 financial obligations received by type




Figure 3 provides a breakdown the total amount received by contribution type. The largest proportion of money received was for offsite affordable housing. Highways, education and recreation all received similar amounts. Not included in the chart above is the four affordable dwellings delivered on-site.

Spent:

In the financial year 2019/2020 the council spent £353,826.47 of S106 agreement contributions that have been received in previous years. The money was spent on a number of different projects, with the majority being spent on highways improvements.

Figure 6: Section 106 contributions spent by type




Figure 6 provides a breakdown of the total amount spent by contribution type. The largest proportion of money spent was for highways on several projects. Recreation was the next largest amount. No money was spent on affordable housing this financial year.

Figure 7 sets out how the Sections 106 monies have been spent within this period. The highways contributions has provided improvements to the local network to provide additional capacity to support the new development.

Held:

At the end of the 2019/20 financial year there was £1,269,573.95 of money retained from previous years which had not yet been spent on relevant projects. This also includes the money allocated for projects.

Figure 8. Section 106 contributions held by type




Figure 8 provides a breakdown of the total amount held by contribution type. The largest proportion of money held is for education to increase pupil places capacity in schools. The next largest amount held is for off-site affordable housing with the only other money currently being held for highways and recreation.

Allocated:

'Allocated' is the planning obligations which have not been spent, but have been earmarked for a future project, for example to improve highways networks or increase school capacity.

Figure 10. Section 106 contributions allocated by type




Figure 10 provides a breakdown for the total amount allocated by contribution type. The largest proportion of money allocated is for highways with similar amounts also allocated for recreation and off-site affordable housing. Please note - Education have two projects at Baysgarth Academy and Bowmandale School, which are not yet complete, so the amount is unknown and thus not reflected in the pie chart.
