

# ROALD DAHL SHAPES

Spot the shapes with the Enormous Crocodile! What shapes can you see?

Little hands can trace the shapes and lift the flap as you look through the book.



#### Making marks with flour.

Sprinkle some flour on a table or a highchair tray. Encourage your child to make marks and shapes in the flour with their fingers.

### Make your own shape sorter.

Make a shape sorter and find objects around the home to post:

- Lids, bottle tops (circle),
- Envelopes, post-its (oblongs and squares)
- Shaped pieces from puzzles or other baby toys



### Using shapes at meal times.



Think about cutting foods in different ways to introduce shapes to your child.

Why not cut sandwiches at lunch time in to a range of shapes for your child to explore.

At meal times, give your child choices, so that they can hear and understand more words. For example, 'Do you want some grapes or a banana?' – showing your child the food items at the same time as naming them. Make sure you give them time to answer.
