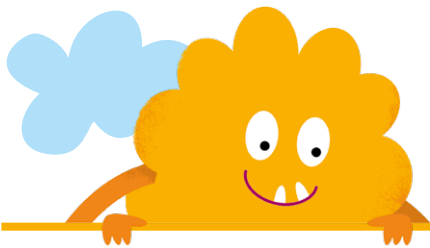


# BABY TOUCH NURSERY RHYMES

## Feely Bag Game



This book has many textures for your child to explore. Why not make your own feely bag? It's a quick game to play with everyday objects.

Fill a cloth bag or pillowcase with familiar objects from around the house or garden - things that are safe to hold. Let your child feel what is in the bag and explore the different textures.

If your child is talking, can they say what the object is? Start to introduce words such as **hard, soft, smooth, rough, warm, cold, round, flat, lumpy** and lots more!



## Rhyme Time

Singing nursery rhymes to babies and toddlers can help develop their language and communication skills from an early age.

They often feature rhythmic patterns and simple repetitive phrases that young children find easy to remember and repeat.

Whilst you sing the rhymes you can add actions with your fingers: e.g. for Incy Wincy you could wiggle them like a spider or move them like the rain or rays of sunshine.
